Commissioner Currey Speaks at Construction Conference

On September 17, Commissioner Currey traveled to New Haven for the Marcum Construction Summit, presented with Connecticut Associated Builders and Contractors (CT ABC) and Construction Financial Management Association (CFMA) of Connecticut. The event was held for construction contractors and related finance and accounting professionals to discuss the economic state of the construction industry.

Commissioner Currey gave an overview and summary of DAS' Division of Construction Services' (DCS) recent activities and plans for the immediate future. "The last several years have seen a marked increase in the amount of State construction activity. Our construction expenditures in 2012 amounted to about \$550 million. This year we are on track to spend more than \$900 million. During the Great Recession, we had deferred some projects but now we are catching up," said Currey to the more than 300 attendees.

She went on to highlight some of the most notable projects:

- The Performing Arts Building at Western Connecticut State University in Danbury, a \$97 million project completed last year and an iconic structure for that campus for decades to come.
- The Buley Library at Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven, a \$25 million dollar renovation that updated and modernized that facility for the 21st century.

- The new Academic Lab building, also at Southern, completed this year at a cost of \$58 million, that will provide a new capability for that institution and its academic mission.
- The new Emmett O'Brien Technical High School project in Meriden, a \$64 million project due to be completed in February 2017.
- A project about to break ground - the Asnuntuck Community College Manufacturing Technology Center in Enfield. This is a \$14 million project expected to be completed in March 2017.
- In February 2014, DCS started constructing a new dormitory on the campus of Central Connecticut State University at the cost of \$67 million.
- Eastern Connecticut State University will have a new Fine Arts Center. This is a \$63 million project.

“All told,” the commissioner said, “Our current DAS project portfolio accounts for about \$1.8 billion in construction costs. That’s all current projects that are in some stage of design or construction. . . .Five years ago, Governor Malloy determined to address our aging and long-neglected public building infrastructure, and by so doing, create high quality construction jobs at a time when there was not a significant amount of private sector work available. It has proven to be a win-win, updating our universities, community colleges, and technical high schools, so as to enhance the education system and maintain the attractiveness of our schools, as well as improving the state’s economy, particularly in the construction trades.”

DAS/BEST Successfully Migrates Hundreds of Millions of Exchange Messages

On May 25, 2015, the DAS/Bureau of Enterprise System and Technology’s Messaging and Directory Services (DMS) successfully completed a statewide initiative to migrate approximately 500,000,000 Exchange messages associated with 43,000 accounts, across 43 agencies from Exchange 2007 to Exchange 2013. The actual migration effort officially began on February 2 with the migration of DAS and ended the week of May 25 with the migration of the Department of Veterans’ Affairs. In addition to the effort to migrate accounts to the new version of Exchange, the DMS team took time last fall to implement the new Exchange environment, which included design changes that resulted in a savings of \$400,000 over what was originally projected for the new environment.

CIO Mark Raymond said: “Across the state our employees rely on email as a primary communication tool. The Directory and Messaging team did an incredible job upgrading this critical capability all while continuing the operation of the state.”

This effort was led by Paul Stevenson, with strong support from Paul Bilodeau and Derek Lewis. However the overall success of this effort was the result of a strong collaboration between the DMS team and our agency IT partners who were instrumental in helping make this effort a success within their own agencies.

The Governor's Committee on Employment of Persons with Disabilities

On August 13, Commissioner Currey participated in a public hearing held by the Governor's Committee on Employment of Persons with Disabilities, of which she is a member. The hearing was held in the River Room at Goodwin College in East Hartford.

The committee consists of various state and local organizations with responsibilities relevant to employment and the charge of the committee is to explore ways to improve employment options for people with disabilities in Connecticut.

As the executive branch coordinator for issues relating to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Commissioner Currey has a keen interest in the work of

the panel. She remarked after the hearing that "I found the comments from the public very informative. There are a wide range of disabilities from Asperger's Syndrome to physical and mental disabilities. It's important that the state hear each and every case, and make effective policy changes to make sure everyone who wants a job – regardless of ability – can find a job here in Connecticut."

Various individuals and organizations with an interest in employing persons with disabilities testified to both the opportunities and challenges faced by such persons in seeking and holding jobs. Several individuals testified to various barriers they have faced, including transportation issues, fair wages, and communication issues.

"Removing the stigma of a disability along with these obstacles benefits not only the individual but the state as a whole," said Commissioner Currey. "I feel strongly that Connecticut is on the right path, but there is always room for improvement."

Equal Employment Opportunity Director Alicia Nunez was in attendance at this hearing.

The Department of Administrative Services administers the property for the state and took the lead in drafting an agreement to allow the Court to establish the garden and to assume responsibility for the landscaping of the parcel.

“It is programs like this that specifically tie into Governor Malloy’s ‘Second Chance Society’ legislation. His package of initiatives is designed to continue the progress being made in reducing the state’s dropping crime rate, which is at a 48-year low, as well as ensuring nonviolent offenders are successfully reintegrated into society and become productive workers in Connecticut’s economy,” said DAS Commissioner Currey.

Commissioner Currey went on to recognize all the contributors who donated time and resources to the project. “This really is the definition of a community coming together to make something wonderful and worthwhile with a great purpose,” she said.

Sherwood Island Ribbon Cutting

DAS, DEEP and State Park Advocates Cut Ribbon for the Newly Renovated Sherwood Island Pavilion In Westport.

Connecticut's Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) and the Department of Administrative Services Division of Construction Services met in June with local officials and state park advocates at Sherwood Island State Park in Westport, for a ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate the renovation and modernization of the well-known pavilion at the historic park. The celebration highlights the importance of maintaining Connecticut's state park system, which has

received \$60 million in recent years for improvements and upgrades.

DEEP Deputy Commissioner Susan Whalen and DAS Division of Construction Services Deputy Commissioner Pasquale "Bud" Salemi gave opening remarks.

DAS Commissioner Melody A. Currey said, "The Department of Administrative Services Division of Construction Services coordinates all the contractors, engineers and architects for this project. It is truly a well-coordinated team effort and we here at DAS are proud to work with DEEP to bring this project to conclusion and give it back to the visitors of Sherwood Island – Connecticut's first state park."

The pavilion at Sherwood Island State Park was built in 1961 and was last renovated 26 years ago. This project was funded by \$3.5 million in state bonding, which the State Bond Commission approved last year. The renovations were completed for the 2015 summer state park season and have contributed 56 jobs to the local economy.

Connecticut's state park system features 109 parks that offer swimming, hiking, picnicking, camping, boating, fishing, and nature programs. The parks attract more than eight million visitors each year.

Recently, DEEP has been moving forward on over \$60 million in projects to improve state parks throughout Connecticut.

Governor Malloy, Lt. Governor Wyman and Commissioner Currey Break Ground on Veterans' Cemetery Improvements

Department of Veterans' Affairs Commissioner Sean Connolly, Governor Dannel P. Malloy, Lieutenant Governor Nancy Wyman, Department of Administrative Services Commissioner Melody Currey, U.S. Department of Veterans' Affairs Director of Veterans Cemetery Grants Program George Eisenbach, and state officials gathered on a beautiful August day to break ground on an expansion of the 24-acre State Veterans Cemetery in Middletown. The improvement project is funded by a \$3.4 million grant from the Veterans Affairs National Cemetery Administration.

Governor Malloy said, "By expanding the Connecticut State Veterans Cemetery and improving its aesthetics, we will be able to continue honoring our state's veterans and enhance a location that serves as a sacred location where we honor our nation's heroes."

Lt. Governor Wyman said, "Our deepest gratitude goes to our federal partners for their support of this project. This is truly a sacred place—the men and women buried here are heroes who made tremendous sacrifices to serve Connecticut and the nation. These improvements are part of our overall commitment to our veterans and their families—a reminder that their service, and their sacrifices, will never be forgotten."

Improvements to the cemetery include creating a 3,000 niche columbarium, upgrades to the current administration and chapel building, road construction, and drainage improvements. The grant covers 100 percent of the \$3.4 million project, which is expected to extend the use of the cemetery by ten years.

DAS Commissioner Currey said, "The Department of Administrative Services is honored and proud to be a part of the cemetery expansion project and grounds improvement process. While we cannot thank our veterans enough for their service and sacrifice, every veteran deserves a dignified and honorable burial and DAS and the State of Connecticut are here to ensure they receive the honors in death that their service in life has merited."



Comptroller Kevin Lembo shared his enthusiasm about all the good the Connecticut State Employees Campaign for Charitable Giving does for needy families/pets and wildlife in Connecticut and worldwide.

Hole in the Wall Gang Fund, Maureen Farrington of Ashford, CT spoke about all their wonderful programs that last all year long, not just for summer camp. “We have cared for children with all sorts of illnesses. There is a disease called Progeria that affects only a handful of children causing them to age rapidly and appear to be 80 years old. We have served 11 of these children! We have summer camp from June through August and then we bring camp to the children - at home or in the hospital.”

National Diaper Bank Network, Troy Moore said, “One third of the mothers lack enough diapers for their children. Our first year of operation we helped 288 mothers get the diapers they needed. Last year we were able to help 25,000. We began in North Haven and now have 257 centers in 47 states. Our mission is to collect and distribute diapers and last year we distributed 37,000,000 diapers to babies! This is our second year with the Campaign for Charitable Giving.”

Some facts about CSEC you may not know:

For every \$1.00 that you donate no more than \$0.25 can go toward administrative costs.

All charities go through a yearly rigorous screening process to verify that administrative costs are below the 25% threshold:

- any charity over the 25% is granted a one year waiver so that they have a chance to bring their administrative costs back to 25% or lower
- if the charity is unable to do so, said charity will not be able to participate in the CSEC until administrative costs are back to the 25% or lower

Making a one-time or a yearly donation to your favorite charity has never been easier at www.employeegiving.ct.gov/. Choose from over 700 CSEC charities and your donation will go directly to the charities you choose. This can be done easily if you make a bi-weekly deduction. The amount appears on your paycheck, giving you an instant tax record.






